#### But I didn't Vote for Them ...

One of the surveys received last term is the 2000 National Election Survey (conducted by Canadian Election Study Group). It surveyed 3648 people and questioned them before and after the election. The primary mandate of this study is: to provide a thorough account of the election; to underline the main reasons why people vote the way they do; to indicate what does and does not change during the campaign and from one election to another; and to highlight similarities and differences between voting and elections in Canada and in other democratic countries.

The second mandate of the study is to contribute to the development of knowledge surrounding the reasons that voters vote the way they do.

The third mandate is to put together a rich set of data about Canadians' attitudes and opinions on a wide variety of social, economic, and political issues.

There are many different areas that can be researched using this survey. For example, the mailback questionnaire contained many different questions:

- how much confidence do you have in the Supreme Court;
- do you agree that we must crack down on crime;
- what volunteer associations have you been part of in the past year;
- do you agree that protecting the environment is more important than protecting jobs; and
- do you know any women who are carpenters.

The above variables can be analyzed with the party the respondent voted for to build a profile of people who vote for the different parties.
